GLOBAL ASIA SECOND MAJOR

Global Asia is an area-focused, interdisciplinary second major committed to humanities scholarship that studies Asia within a global context. It is ideal for SMU students from all backgrounds who want supplement their undergraduate studies with specialised knowledge about Asia.

The last few decades have witnessed Asia's dramatic rise in the global stage as key countries like China, India, Japan, South Korea, and Singapore emerge as major economic and geopolitical powerhouses. At the same time, industrialising countries such as Indonesia, the Philippines and Pakistan are set to grow rapidly with a dynamism that has led many observers to dub the 21st Century as 'the Asian Century.' However, while Asia is re-emerging as a major centre of economic growth, innovation, and world history, it also faces enormous problems related to inequality, poverty, environmental degradation, migration, geo-political tensions, and social and personal upheaval.

Within these changing regional and global landscapes, the Global Asia second major strives to meet the rising demand for knowledge about Asian societies, cultures, and contemporary politics. Courses within the programme integrate knowledge from various disciplines in order to give students a holistic approach to the study of Asia.

Embedded within the program are enriched activities that include a course taught in collaboration with partner organisations, a humanities-based study mission to an Asian country, special internships with international organizations and NGOs, and joint programs/partnership arrangements with leading universities in East and Southeast Asia. Making use of Singapore's strategic location as a regional hub for arts and culture, the programme also employs interactive teaching methodologies that involve visits to museums, seasonal arts exhibitions, civil society groups, as well as other relevant events around our vibrant city.

Learning outcomes

The Global Asia second major aims to produce globally-minded students with in-depth knowledge of their own region of Asia. Designed to accommodate students from diverse degree programs across SMU's Schools, this second major will equip students with the necessary skills to navigate their way through Asia's changing social, economic, and geopolitical terrains.

By the end of this course, students would have acquired:

- Understanding of the great diversity of cultures and societies in Asia
- Specialised knowledge about the complex history and political economy of Asia
- Knowledge of humanities-based analytical methods and theories to critically analyse contemporary issues in Asia
- Opportunities to apply skills in solving real-life problems faced by Asia-based institutions, organisations, and communities through experiential learning (SMU-X courses, study missions, and specialised internship programs)
